As memories come along and moments passes away, I still remember my exchange year as a sophomore student in Marshfield Massachusetts for a whole year. Well, I've wanted to be an Exchange Student my whole high school life. I read about summer programs in a brochure from YES Program, and I thought then that living somewhere else from Pakistan for a year and having friends from another country would be the coolest thing in the world.



I was placed with the greatest host family, they treated me like their own family members and they are like real family in another part of the world. I had a host mom, a host dad, a brother and a sister. Through e-mails we established that I was going to call them Mom and Dad. I got unconditional love and support from my host community.

There are so many highlights of my exchange year that it would probably make me write a whole book on it, but the ones that standout was attending my local church "Saint Christine" for the first time would definitely be one. Meeting with new faces, and long discussions with Father Tom



gave me an insight of the religion other than my own.



Moreover, getting selected among thousands of exchange students for a Better Understanding for Better World Conference at Orlando, Florida was truly a dream come true. With exchange

students from 15 different countries, we learned a great deal of knowledge. We Emphasized more on what we have in common than the differences. We visited Mosques, Churches, and Synagogues to table-talks with the scholars.

Being at Disney had its own charm. Girl Scout Leadership Conference at Rhode Island and camping with the Girl Scout of America ignited the true essence of being adventurous, kayaking, water rafting to bonfires and s'mores, I enjoyed every bit of being a Girl Scout.
